As the first head of the Fine Arts Department at the University of the Punjab, Lahore, she is particularly renowned for her significant contribution to the development of modern art practices in Pakistan. Anna Molka Ahmed was born in London in 1917 and came from a multicultural family, which had a big impact on her artistic perspective. She returned to the subcontinent with a great desire to contribute to the advancement of art education after obtaining formal art education from prominent European schools.

WORK

The main characteristics of Anna Molka Ahmed's artwork are its expressive style, strong brushstrokes, and intense emotional content. She primarily used oil paints and experimented with a variety of themes, such as country life, landscapes, portraits, and scenes from Pakistani daily life. A strong feeling of location and identity is shown in her paintings, which frequently feature farmers, rural ladies, mountains, and architectural shapes. Her use of colour is one of the most remarkable aspects of her work. To create atmosphere and mood, she chose warm browns, greens, deep blues, and earthy tones. She placed more emphasis on structural composition and emotional expression than on realistic detail. Her figures have a timeless, monumental appearance since they frequently appear solid and simplistic.

Anna Molka Ahmed was an important easel painter and art professor. She established systematic art education, including painting, sculpture, and art history, when she founded Punjab

University's Fine Arts Department in 1940. She taught a number of well-known Pakistani artists, which makes her contribution to art even more important than her own work.




Portrait of Sufi Waqar (1964)

Her role as a female artist and educator was innovative. She asserted that women could lead, teach, and develop in the arts, challenging patriarchal norms. Her leadership in an academic setting was uncommon for her era and served as a source of inspiration for Pakistani women artists.
